Annual Report 2022 - 2023

Hunter New England Local Health District (HNELHD) Non-Government Organisation (NGO) Program Unit provides high quality administrative, management and support services to NGO's funded both through the NSW Ministry of Health (MoH) and HNELHD. Funding enables NGOs to deliver valuable community-based activities that support the health and wellbeing of the public, particularly vulnerable or hard to reach populations.

Administration and management of the NGO Program is guided by NSW Health Policy PD2019_013 Administration of NSW Health Grant Funding for Non-Government Organisations. Principles include a focus on grant planning and design, collaboration, outcomes, value for money, proportionality, governance, accountability, probity and transparency.

The HNELHD NGO Program Unit continues to work alongside the MoH and Health funded NGOs to ensure that purchased services are strategically aligned with NSW Health priorities and local health needs with clear and appropriate performance measures demonstrating effectiveness and value for money.

The Unit would like to recognise the key role played by HNELHD NGO Policy officers and Program Leads in provision of support to deliver best practice evidence-based outcomes.

NGO Program Unit Key Achievements

- Successful administration of the Program: NGO Unit activities included negotiation of Funding Agreements, payment, monitoring, performance review, ministerial briefing, and capacity building support to 34 NGO projects performed by 25 NGOs with funding totaling \$6,016,002.
- Provision of local support, guidance and collaboration opportunities to health funded NGOs through NGO Forum meetings, information updates and site visits. The NGO Forum for 22/23 was hosted by We Help Ourselves (WHOs) and featured NGO project managers presenting work on the theme of 'improving health outcomes through positive care experiences'. A tour of the AOD residential rehabilitation facility was also conducted by WHOs staff and residents. The NGO Unit would like to recognise the generosity of the WHOs community for hosting an enjoyable and interesting visit.
- NGO Unit engaged Justice Connect Not for Profit (NFP) Law to conduct a 3-hour training webinar to assist Health Funded NGO Boards with governing their NFP organisation in August 2022. The training was conducted at no cost and covered legal roles and duties of committee/board members, legal structure of organisations and the difference between governance and management. Some NGOs also participated in the "Free Governance Health Checks" funded by the NSW Governments Social Sector Transformation Fund also conducted by Justice Connect.
- The NGO Program Manager participated in the NSW AOD NGO Reference group facilitated by the Centre for Alcohol and Other Drugs.
- Facilitated a one-year grant agreement with Hunter Ageing Alliance and NovaCare, funded by the Minister for Health, to trial the Active Stronger Better pilot program.

Funding is reported in current NSW Health Program streams; Women's Health, Aged Care, Palliative Care, Chronic Care and Disability, Community Transport, Population Health, Drug and Alcohol, Mental Health, Children, Youth and Families and Oral Health.

Women's Health

Funding in the Women's Health stream aims to improve the health of marginalised and disadvantaged women, Aboriginal women, women who experience violence, culturally and linguistically diverse women, women living with a disability and rural and/or remote women. In 2022-2023 \$586,600 was funded for the provision of information, referral, counselling, advocacy and outreach to women, as well as the provision of assessment, advice and referral for at risk clients in relation to chronic disease.

Aged Care

The Aged Care program aims to support older people (and carers) to remain as independent as possible and be able to participate in community life in a safe and aged friendly environment. Funding to the value of \$300,203 was provided as a contribution towards direct service delivery of home nursing and the ESTEEM After Stroke wellness and reablement project.

Palliative Care

Funding for trained volunteer palliative care programs across HNELHD aims to improve the quality of life for people and their families/carers with a life limiting illness, expanding community-based palliative care services, especially in rural areas and for special needs populations. Funding to the value of \$172,000 was provided to two volunteer palliative care programs supporting carers with respite and/or companion care for people living in Dungog and Maitland Local Government Areas.
